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Message from the Mayor of Swanage, Councillor Avril Harris



Summer is over and we are now in an unusually mild autumn but the temporary flood barriers by the Stone Quay and the Mowlem slipway remind us that winter storms are on their way. The town was thronged with visitors over the summer season and into September and half-term week seemed busy too, so let's hope this has helped local businesses to recoup the losses caused by lockdown. We missed the usual events in the summer – no Carnival or Rotary Fete but there were three all-day fundraiser concerts in the bandstand. In July, BBC *Songs of Praise* was recorded at Prince Albert Gardens, and also in the Gardens in August, hundreds attended a memorial concert for Henry Searle, a 26-year-old local man who died after bravely combatting a brain tumor. September saw the welcome return of the Folk Festival, a little slimmed down, but a nonetheless a busy and colourful weekend, and there have been rowing events as well, and also a Blues Weekend.

It's good to see that voluntary groups are getting back in their stride. As well as arranging volunteers to visit older people who feel isolated and in need of social contact, *Linking Lives* offers a café-style weekly drop-in at 103a High Street, near the Methodist Church, on Tuesdays and Thursdays, 10-12. It's good that there is contact between *Good Neighbours*, the long-established *Communicare* and *Linking Lives*. Thank you to all those volunteers who help make life better for so many!

Do remember that Covid 19 infection rate is high locally and wearing a face mask helps to protect yourself and others from catching the virus. Third "jabs" are being administered at pace over at Wareham hospital and vaccinations are readily available for those who might need first or second doses. Older people should be getting a letter to book a flu vaccination.

This month there are two public meetings, the first being the launch on zoom of *Swanage Community Housing*, an idea fostered by the Town Council and now fledged as an independent group which has formed a community land trust to build affordably rented homes for "locals". This is at 7pm on Wednesday, 10th November and the link can be found on www.swanagecommunityhousing.org. On Thursday, 11th November at 7pm, there is a public meeting at the Emmanuel Baptist Centre to sound out opinions and answer queries about the future use of the old St Mark's School playing fields which, after much delay, have been leased to the Town Council.

This year sees the 100th anniversary of the Royal British Legion. Swanage's Armistice Day commemoration will take place at the War Memorial as usual at 11am on Thursday, 11th November. The Town Remembrance Day Service is at St Mary's Parish Church on Sunday, 13th November at 2.30p.m. and all are welcome.

They help develop sustainable policies for the local economy, transport, tourism and energy. National Parks help the tourism sector to extend the season, promote eco, heritage, cultural and dark skies tourism; and help manage tourism pressures. This is a unique opportunity for Dorset.

Building Affordable Homes for Swanage

A new local community-based charitable trust, Swanage Community Housing, is all set for its launch event at an online Zoom event being staged on Wednesday 10th November 7:00-8:30pm. To register please go to their website: swanagecommunityhousing.org The organisation, established as a community benefit society, is calling for the whole Swanage community to rally behind its objective of building new affordable homes to rent in the town. Local resident and trustee Rosalind Suttle said: “we have been trying to find secure accommodation for us and our three children for years, so we really do know how important this is and are thrilled to be part of this project.”

Swanage Town Council, which helped bring about the creation of the Trust, has pledged to make land available for an innovative development of sustainable homes. Dorset Council has provided seed funds and the group has already identified potential funding sources to help get spades in the ground.

Robin Sutcliffe, chair of Swanage Community Housing, said: “Everyone knows that there is a real shortage of affordable rental housing for local families and for key workers in Swanage. We’re excited at the prospect of being able to harness community energy and creativity to try to address this issue.” Swanage Community Housing will join more than three hundred similar community-led housing organisations and Community Land Trusts around the country. The rapidly growing movement has been able to benefit from recent grant-funding, including a dedicated Community Housing Fund. Swanage is following in the footsteps of other Dorset communities, such as the successful development of affordable homes recently put up in Worth Matravers.

Robin Sutcliffe added: “Back in 2016 in a survey of Swanage residents, 89% agreed that the town needed more affordable housing. We all know of someone whose daughter or son, niece or nephew has had to move out of Swanage to find a home, or of a care worker or nurse who works for the people of Swanage but can’t afford to live here.”

The launch of Swanage Community Homes will take place online, using Zoom, at 7pm on Wednesday November 10th, and free tickets to attend are available at swanagecommunityhousing.org. All who support the organisation’s aims will be invited to become members. Membership is £5, and members have a stake and a vote in the organisation’s development.

The committee is also looking for local residents who are interested in joining them as trustees of the charity. Anyone with skills in finance, development, project management, or administration, will be particularly welcome, however energy and enthusiasm are as important as skills!

The launch event will be chaired by local resident Rosalind Suttle, who has first-hand experience of the challenge of finding an affordable Swanage home, and guest speakers are Andrew Bibby from the successful Calder Valley Community Land Trust in Yorkshire and Vanessa White a founder member of Powerstock Community Land Trust in West Dorset.

Purbeck Sustainable Tourism Plan



Having been involved in the development of Planet Purbeck since the start, it was fantastic to be involved in the recent Festival. The amount of energy and will it took to organise and then deliver was so impressive, and it felt that a movement built on Zoom finally became real! 200 events, 60 organisations involved ... it definitely wasn't perfect, but what a start. The parade on the Sunday led by Purbeck's future was a great way to finish.

One of the best things Planet Purbeck has done is to raise the issue of Sustainable Tourism. As part of the Purbeck Heaths partnership we've been able to start the process of bringing people together to create a Sustainable Tourism Plan for that protected landscape. Our first meeting was last week. The enthusiasm from the 35 people from 22 different businesses, local parish councillors, land owners and NGO's to work together to protect the nature, landscape and communities – but also provide better experiences for visitors - was really positive and optimistic. We're working with the Travel Foundation and, if you are interested, it is worth checking out some of the initiatives within the travel industry such as Future of Tourism and Tourism Declares. The pandemic provided a bit of space for the sector to think more deeply about who actually benefits from tourism and what that industry serves.

Our plan for the Purbeck Heaths should be completed by the end of February, so check out our fledgling website at purbeckheaths.org.uk when it's live, or find information via the National Trust website.

Build Back Beaver



Purbeck residents have until 17 November to take part in a government consultation into the reintroduction of beavers to England.

After around 400 years of extinction in England, in August 2020 a wild population of beavers were officially given permission to remain in the River Otter, Devon. The government has now launched a landmark consultation regarding their wider reintroduction to the country.

The Purbeck Beaver Project is currently working with stakeholders to draw up plans for a phased reintroduction of beavers to Purbeck. The National Trust and other partner organisations will submit responses that incorporate local feedback, but this is a public consultation and individuals are also encouraged to take part. It's your opportunity to share your feedback (however long or short) directly with the government.

If you are supportive of beavers and would like a say in the conditions for their reintroduction; if you have concerns that you would like to highlight; or if you would like to comment on how they are managed in the future, your contribution to the consultation can be submitted via an online form found here: <https://www.gov.uk/government/consultations/beaver-reintroduction-and-management-in-england>. **Last call for submissions is 11:45pm on 17 November 2021.**

Once you've followed the link you can expect to see five main topics, from criteria for wild and enclosed beaver releases, to the monitoring and management of reintroduction sites and requests for government support. At each stage you'll learn about the government's plans and then have an opportunity to either agree or disagree, plus offer lengthier comments if you wish. If you cannot fill a section, just put an X and carry on. What you have done will still be helpful. It's more involved than signing a petition, but it's also a great opportunity to find out more about beavers and the current proposed plans for their reintroduction.



As a result of thorough stakeholder engagement and feasibility work throughout the Isle of Purbeck over the past two years, the Purbeck Beaver Project team feel like we have a strong understanding of local needs: both how to manage beaver impacts where required and the support which will be needed to make a beaver reintroduction successful in the long-term. Naturally, we recognise the need to support local landowners and to promote long-term thinking, both within the initial project area, but also for our neighbouring catchments.

It's our hope that beavers will become the heart of a wilder Purbeck landscape: a source of inspiration, education and pride for all of us. This consultation (along with all of our surveying, modelling and planning so far) is about making the best possible success of a reintroduction plan. By making a success of learning to live alongside beavers again in Purbeck, we can also play a vital role in their return to the rest of the UK.

Beyond our Wildest Dreams

THE environmental group **Planet Purbeck** has hailed its first festival as “a success way beyond our expectations”. It follows a survey that showed an overwhelmingly positive response from those who enjoyed some of the 200-plus events staged over six days during last month’s festival.

Responses to a questionnaire circulated by Planet Purbeck:

- 71 per cent feel inspired to make positive change.
- 63 per cent feel more connected to the local community.
- 58 per cent learned something new about protecting Purbeck’s environment.
- 42 per cent feel more connected to local nature.
- 35 per cent tried or discovered something new.

In addition, 70 per cent of respondents agreed with the statement: “The festival inspired me to make a change to my own behaviour or lifestyle that will positively impact the planet.”



Changes mentioned included linking up with environmental groups, becoming a volunteer, getting involved with community litter-picks, avoiding plastics, changing diet, shopping more locally, being more aware of seasonal produce, improving home insulation and exploring the use of solar panels.



Joint festival organiser, Rob Waitt said: *“We are thrilled it seems to have made such an impact.”*

“It was so heartening to see the way it brought the community together and made so many people think about what they can do to address the climate emergency while protecting and enhancing our amazing local area.”

“We remain grateful to all the organisations, businesses and groups who staged events under the Planet Purbeck umbrella and we know many of them enjoyed the week as much as those who came along to their activities.”

“It may have been the first Planet Purbeck Festival – but it certainly won’t be the last. We are already working hard on the next one.”

The festival was backed by East Dorset benefactors The Talbot Village Trust, who were keen to support an environmental cause, especially one battling climate change.

Rob said: *“We were so grateful to the Trust and especially their chairman Nick Ashley-Cooper, who saw the potential of what we were doing and generously gave the funds to make it happen.”*

and get the world infected!





Community Speed Watch update:

Our Community Speed Watch Volunteers have been out and about over the last couple of months helping to keep our parish safe, and I think we can all agree that keeping everyone safe is a worthwhile task. So, it may shock you when I say I personally have attended 2 roadside sessions and although I was warned about verbal abuse nothing could have prepared me for the amount of abuse directed at us, from verbal swearing to hand gestures it is really quite shocking, especially when there are children in the car! Despite our wonderful volunteers shrugging off the abuse as "part of the role," volunteers simply deserve more respect, so please if you see our volunteers out and about helping to keep our parish safe, make their day and smile.



Playground New Equipment Installation update:

You will know that by now the Parish Council were hoping to announce the installation of the new playground equipment. However, there have been a few minor hiccups along the way, but we understand from the installers that the new date for installation is planned for January 2022.

Planning Application update:

At the time of writing this article Corfe Castle Parish Council have yet to host the public meeting for Corfe Castle residents to have their questions answered and views listened to about the Community Land Trust planning application (application number 6/2021/0405). However, by the time you read this, the meeting will have taken place and Corfe Castle Parish Council will have submitted their official comments to Dorset Council for them to consider before either approving or rejecting the application.

Purbeck Park Car Parking Charges

25-years ago a strategy was agreed for Purbeck Park to have a low parking cost so it became the off-village parking centre. However, Dorset Council have a new parking strategy which would see the parking fees at Purbeck Park increase to £6 per day.

Corfe Castle Parish Council have stated their objection to the price increase for Purbeck Park and believe this will not encourage people to park away from the village.

DORSET COUNCIL UPDATES

World Mental Health Day – “Don’t suffer in silence” was the message from Dorset Council on World Mental Health Day which was held on Sunday 10th October 2021.

Help and support is on offer from partner agencies and local organisations, including Dorset Healthcare (<https://www.dorsethealthcare.nhs.uk/access-mental-health>) - and **Dorset Mind** (<https://dorsetmind.uk>).

Housing Register – The new Dorset Council Home Choice system has been set up and anyone already registered who wishes to remain on the register must re-register before 1st December. If you don’t, you will be removed from the Dorset Council register. To re-register go to <https://www.dorsetcouncil.gov.uk/housing/housing/re-registration-process>.

Local Heritage Location – Land use consultants have been appointed to manage the Local Heritage list campaign which will allow communities across Dorset to nominate local buildings, sites, monuments and features to be included on the new Heritage list. Further details can be found on the Dorset Council website.

Keeping Warm and Energy Bills - Dorset Council is looking at ways to help residents keep warm in the colder months and different ways to reduce their energy bill. Dorset Council is working with the Local Energy Advice partnership who offer free advice and have access to energy saving devices to those that are eligible. NATIONAL TRUST UPDATES

Quinquennial Repair Works – The National Trust are in the tender stage and inviting contractors in over the next couple of weeks. The National Trust have identified some areas of the castle that need some urgent attention, and this has been prioritised for completion ASAP. Work should start as soon as weather, and contractor workforce allows. There is no danger to visitors even in the areas that we have identified.

High Rope Inspections – The National Trust had High Rope inspections completed last week by Sally Strachey Historic Conservation Ltd, the National Trust are waiting for the report to be finished and sent back but in general the team are happy with the conditions on the top of the high areas. These are mainly the Keep and South West Gate Houses.

Santa's Grotto – The National Trust have been in contact the Festivities Committee and have agreed with the team that once again they will be able to use the Tea-Room to host Santa and friends on 4th December. The National Trust will be turning on the castle lights the same evening once the village Xmas lights has been illuminated. They will remain on throughout the evenings of December and set to turn off roughly at 11pm.

Village Welcome Map – The National Trust is hoping to produce a Welcome Leaflet for the Village, with a focus on the local businesses and points of interest in and around the village – places to eat, model village, pubs, town museum, train station etc. There will be no cost to the businesses in the village, The National Trust will be sending out letters / emails, over the next month or so, to the local community to gauge their levels of interest.

Why is it important to sign the petition asking Dorset Council to help?

We are expecting Dorset Clinical Commissioning Group to launch a public engagement on the future of the Swanage based Paramedic Car. We will keep you posted about this, and about how to make your voice heard.

If Dorset Clinical Commissioning Group later decides to withdraw the Car, we will look to Dorset Council to enforce the promise that the Clinical Commissioning Group made that, in the light of the loss of Poole A&E, Maternity and Paediatrics, Swanage based ambulance resources would be fully maintained. We will also look to Dorset Council to refer any plan to withdraw the Car to the Secretary of State as this is a matter of life and death. The Car attends over 400 calls per year where there is risk to life - in Swanage alone.

Now over 35 Defibrillators across Purbeck

This year has been a rollercoaster for many, but with covid restrictions being relaxed back in the summer, the SCDP have been able to resume some form of business as usual. It has been nice to finally meet face-to-face, (albeit partially covered by masks) and seems a lot more productive meeting in person.

We had hoped to hold our AGM in November where all stakeholders and interested parties would have been welcome, but we have decided to postpone until the New Year in the hope that coronavirus levels in our area will have significantly dropped.

Like most organisations, fundraising has been difficult these past couple of years. We have all had to adapt to a 'new normal' way of operating. We have been very fortunate that the residents, businesses and community groups of Purbeck continue to reach out and help. Particular mention should be made of a local public house in Swanage High Street who gifted the Partnership - not just another defibrillator - but a cabinet in which to house it and some accessories. This takes our estate to over 35 devices across Purbeck and we are currently in consultation with third parties over siting it. This device is earmarked for North Swanage where we have an identified gap in coverage.

In October, we were warmly invited by Mr and Mrs Alan Fry to Kingston Country Courtyard where a fundraising event was being held. Members of the Partnership attended and spoke about our ongoing work and provided a familiarisation session on using the defibrillator.

Our devices continue to be deployed and utilised at emergency medical incidents across Purbeck, with early defibrillation part of the chain of survival in cardiac arrest. As we move towards the end of 2021, we will be reviewing our estate and discussing how we take the project forward, and warmly welcome anyone interested in offering their skills and support to the Partnership.

STUDLAND SNIPPETS



Studland Parish Council

Behind the façade of this sleepy seasonal village, much is moving. The redevelopment of the Knoll House Hotel seems to be going forward. Maybe in the near future we shall see how many trees are to be felled, how many holiday units are to be built, where all of the cars will park, how many local jobs will be created, and how the concept of a resort associated with the hotel will sit beside such an environmentally sensitive area with international designation? An initial planning application indicated development, the like that Studland has not seen since the 30 Council houses built in 1947.

Increased coastal erosion is impacting on the cliff face below the wartime architecture of Fort Henry. Will Historic England designate this structure as an asset at risk? Will the National Trust break with their commitment of no intervention and create sea defences? Will there be consideration of a natural retreat and the recreation of the site using virtual reality? How will the views of residents and visitors influence decision makers, if at all?

Plans are being considered for more planting of bulbs and trees including a Jubilee Tree or two for 2022. In a few of years' time, will there be more and thicker hedges encouraging wildlife, especially birds, and screening some of the visual intrusion as seen from the road into Swanage? Shall we see the reinstatement of the Acacia, Silver Beech, Poplar, Sweet and Horse Chestnut trees much loved by Henrietta Bankes, or just a few more Oak trees? Conventional wisdom or Mediterranean species may create choices that will shape parts of the village.

The Parish Council is still waiting to hear from Dorset Council about an application for a group Tree Preservation Order for trees east of the Knoll House Hotel made in December 2019. The temporary Traffic Regulation Order relating to parking on the ferry road runs out. Has it been a success? Will it be renewed despite apparently uneven enforcement?. A Tranquilty Garden is being created near to Manor Farm House - an area of peace and quiet for residents. Somewhat strange when there is so much tranquillity all around the area, even if it takes a little walk. Traffic safety concerns may lead to measures to reduce speeding vehicles, yet nothing to contain the cyclists who seem to race from Dean Hill to the Ferry Road. Maybe '20isPLENTY' should be applied through the village - its time has come, especially with demands for climate change actions.

The Purbeck Society

The survey of non-listed heritage assets in Swanage has now been produced. This will be soon on the website of the Purbeck Society <https://purbeckociety.co.uk> and the Dorset AONB (Area of Outstanding Natural Beauty). The report is a call for action for all parish and town councils, as they can adopt similar approaches to listing and retaining their local heritage assets. The Purbeck Society is concerned with potentially unauthorised development relating to residential creep from a former farm and campsite in Swanage. In addition, the Purbeck Society is very concerned that Dorset Council no longer issue yellow notices and letters to neighbours when there are planning applications. The applicant is now required to do the job of Dorset Council. Surely this situation demands to be reversed in order to maintain confidence in planning in Dorset? Tree works application notices seem not to be sent from Dorset Council; interested parties have to find these details from the Dorset Council website - hardly democratic engagement.

CPRE Campaign to Protect Rural England

Dorset CPRE is analysing the responses to the consultation on the Dorset Local Plan. The AONB in Dorset is threatened by this plan. Far too many houses are planned for this designated area. Given current trends, most of these houses will not go to local residents, as the house prices will be beyond their reach. Seemingly, there are more than 90% of objections to the approach taken by Dorset Council to this plan. Developers are the

ones who favour the Dorset Council approach. Will this be a plan for the residents of Dorset, or for developers to carve up Dorset with unwanted market housing, out of reach of local residents? Watch out for future press releases on the consultation responses. Dorset CPRE and DorsetCAN (Climate Action Network) are planning to send a letter to every councillor in Dorset urging them to rethink the Dorset Local Plan. Any Local Plan must address the climate and ecological emergencies that face us all. Watch out for this in the media.

A scheme for local schools is being implemented, where a prize will be awarded for pupils and students whose work and interests reflect the natural environment of Dorset. The scheme is for post-16 schools and colleges. Dorset CPRE is keen to develop and renew the hedges of the county. Do get in touch if you can help. Common sense has prevailed and our campaign, and that of other Friends around Dorset, has been successful.

So many thanks to all of you who took the trouble to write and tell us your experiences – I am sure your evidence played a vital part in getting our MIU walk-in service back.

So now we have other problems to face: we are worried about the effect on our hospital of having a part-time Matron; sharing her with Wimborne is far from ideal in our view. We are particularly anxious that services in the Day Surgery Unit should resume and the number of our Outpatient Clinics is expanded bringing care closer to home back in focus once again.



National Insurance Number 'compromised' cold call

We've been made aware that an official sounding voice usually claiming to be from the National Crime Agency or 'National Office for Serious Crimes' has been cold calling unsuspecting members of the public, asking them to call back urgently. Fraudsters will then try to manipulate you into handing over personal information using a web of lies and threats.

We've heard from dozens of people targeted by this scam over the past few months. Action Fraud data shows it is the most reported phone scam of this year so far, having received more than 1,000 reports.

One victim told us that when he returned the call he was falsely told that someone had been using his National insurance number (NINo) to claim Universal Credit. The scammer told him that if he didn't hand over his personal details so they could make a 'correction' he would be liable to repay thousands of pounds in fraudulently claimed benefits and could be sent to prison. At this point he realised something wasn't right and put the phone down, but the scammers continued to try and get in touch with him for more than a week.

Other victims have told us similar stories, all in which the scammers told them they had to hand over their personal information to be issued with a new NINO number.

Don't be pressured for your details

In reality, there's very little damage anyone could do with just your National Insurance number, even if

someone had access to it. But your other personal details, such as your name, date of birth, address and bank details are much more valuable to criminals. They could use this information to target you with more personalised scams, or try to gain access to your accounts.

No government organisation would ever pressure you to hand over sensitive information, and if you're uncomfortable or unsure, just hang up the call.

The National Crime Agency is unlikely to call consumers directly about their National Insurance numbers. Which? has contacted it about this cold call and will publish any response here.

If you have concerns about your National Insurance number you can visit www.gov.uk which offers contact numbers and web chat support.

How to protect yourself

If you've been tricked by this scam, don't worry. There are a few things you can do to protect yourself.

Contact your bank if you're worried that you've given away your bank account or payment details.

You can also sign up to Cifas. It's a not-for-profit fraud prevention service that monitors the use of your details to apply for bank accounts, credit cards or loans.

Trevor Chadwick Memorial Trust Prize Draw

Mowlem Theatre

Tuesday 9th November 7.30pm



A superb bronze maquette (limited edition) is the prize which will be drawn at the Mowlem Community Room on the evening of the 9th November at 7.30pm. The Town Mayor, Councillor Avril Harris, will be making the draw. *A cash alternative of £1,500 is offered.*

Until a few years ago, the truly outstanding and brave exploits of Trevor Chadwick, a local school teacher at Forres School (now the Purbeck View School) were virtually unknown. They were uncovered by researchers and members of the Town Council who discovered that Trevor was instrumental in saving the lives of 669 refugee children from certain death at the hands of the Nazis.

Initially Trevor was asked to travel to Prague in 1938 to bring back two refugee children so that they could be supported and educated at Forres. This he did, but whilst he was there, he was so moved by the plight of other children that he returned in December of that year and spent the next 6 months organising the rescue of 669 children bringing them back to this country to safety.



Amongst those rescued was Gerda Mayer. Gerda became a famous poet and the dedication in her 1988 collection of poems *A Heartache of Glass* is 'to the memory of Muriel Chadwick and her son Trevor Chadwick to whom I owe my preservation'. Also Alf Dubbs (now Baron Dubbs) who became a British politician serving in Tony Blair's Government.

When Trevor's exploits were uncovered it was thought fitting that the town should pay a tribute to an unsung local hero who played such a vital part with Kinderstransport.

A full life size statue has been commissioned which will be positioned on the newly named Trevor Chadwick Play Park. The town appointed locally-based, but nationally renowned, sculptress Moira Purver who lives in Langton Matravers to undertake the commission.

A small number of quarter-sized maquettes were also commissioned, one of which is the prize of the draw.

As we 'look forward' to November and the coming winter, there is a general atmosphere of fear and pessimism especially for those on low income who may have seen a cut to their income with the ending of furlough and universal credit top-up payments. To add to their difficulties, there will be an increase in energy prices and cost of living. Meanwhile, Covid cases locally are on the increase.

So where does that leave the rest of us, and Swanage Food Bank in particular? Crisis times such as these create opportunities to show extra community concern for those amongst us who are suffering most. It may mean giving food items more generously in the SFB collection bins in stores when we are shopping for ourselves. For Swanage Food Bank (SFB) it will probably be an even busier time - although demands did not particularly dip in the summer months - and our food resources may be over-stretched at a time when shortages in shops make bulk-buying a serious challenge for us.

However, I am confident that all SFB's needs will be supplied as in the past. Even recently, Swanage schools, churches and individuals shared their Harvest-time gifts of much-needed food items so that empty shelves were replenished, however temporarily. A big thanks for such kind giving which enables SFB to alleviate food poverty. We also assist clients seriously struggling to pay their fuel for cooking and heating, though we are monitoring fuel top-ups closely so that clients will not become dependent on such help.

At present, we have a reduced Home Deliveries Team which means that we may not be able to offer that service to all of our clients. We are currently recruiting for more volunteer drivers (please ring our Admin if you are interested: 07713637208). Such help is invaluable, and we are so grateful to our SFB Home Deliverers. I am thankful too for being able to work with other Members of our Duty Team and Trustees who work so hard and willingly for SFB.

So, whilst acknowledging that times are difficult, I end with a note of heartfelt thanksgiving.
