Pleasure Grounds Project Update



We are now in the final year of our Durlston Pleasure Grounds project and will be spending the next few months completing the final parts of the project. Just a few of the upcoming plans include;

- **Restoration of the Egyptian Seat (pictured)**

The bench was commissioned by George Burt in 1887. It's thought to have been inspired by a trip he took to Egypt, where he repeatedly took to the Great Pyramids with a hammer and chisel to take his own specimens!

- **New gates at Tilly Whim Caves**

These will allow visitors to peer through the lower gate into the cave. The main cave will remain closed for safety reasons and to not disturb the bats. We will also close the upper gate during the adder season - I've seen them fall from here one too many times!

- **Planting Black Pines throughout the woodland**

Black Pine trees were once a prominent feature of what was once known as the 'Pine-cliff walk'. However, most of these pines have been lost over the years, with very few new ones having naturally regenerated. Planting new saplings will conserve this aspect of the park's heritage.



RECENT ACHIEVEMENTS in the project include:

- **978m of dry stone wall has been rebuilt since 2018**

Originally built in the late 1800s, George Burt hoped that the walls lining walks through the Pleasure Grounds would provide a unique selling point for a housing development, but the scheme was largely unsuccessful. Over time, most of walls had collapsed and the stone taken away, so it's quite the achievement to have nearly finished restoring this important feature of the landscape.

- **Over £200 was raised at our 'Shed' Crafts Stall**

Thank you to everyone who donated or made items for the stall. The top selling items were Plants, Daffodils, Bird Boxes, and Gerald's wood-carved dolphins. The money raised goes towards the Shed and all of the great work being done across the Pleasure Grounds Project.



THANK YOU, VOLUNTEERS!

With all the physical work going on around the park, let us not forget to mention some of our other volunteers, such as those at Durlston Castle. Our lovely counter volunteers are always ready to greet you on arrival at the Visitor Centre, help give information and answer any questions you might have. Behind the scenes, they are always busy helping with admin, managing the shop and assisting the rangers. A massive thankyou to them all!

WHERE ARE THE COWS?

We have 14 of last years calves currently grazing in the Lighthouse Field. The 'mums' are still back at the farm and expected back (with new littl'uns) in April.

PARKRUN

We have been discussing a 'Parkrun' here at Durlston. Working with the Parkrun organisation, we are very close to finalising a route and ensuring all the required guidelines are in place. The route will follow the surfaced paths through the wood and along the cliff, avoiding the more delicate habitats of the meadows and downs and is set to be one of the hardest-going Parkrun's yet! For those not sure what it is - Parkrun is a 5km route which is 'run, jogged, walked' every Saturday morning starting 9am by anybody and everybody! We hope these will begin in the spring.

55 Years: Proud to be Friends



Wareham Hospital Friends have supported the hospital, its services and - very importantly - its staff for well over 55 years and have been very proud of that association with such an important asset to local health services in the wider Purbeck.

Sadly over the years the hospital has not received the recognition it deserves for its in-patient care (until October 2018 when all beds were closed) and for the many out-patient services it continues to provide and until Covid hit and the Hospital used as the Purbeck Vaccination Centre, many did not even know there was a hospital in Wareham! This situation has changed but we were disappointed to see that the hospital does not feature on a new map of Wareham recently unveiled by the Wareham Mayor at the Railway Station.

Since 2015 the Friends have taken a very proactive approach aiming to work "with" the Statutory organisations. We recognised that health care would be provided in a different way in future; in our own homes when possible, with the support of community teams. We changed our Constitution to also support the Purbeck community services based at Bonnets Lane in Wareham. Staff here work as an Integrated team with social care colleagues aiming to 'join up' our care.

Established links enable us to hear of the many initiatives being developed and hopefully extended in Purbeck including Community Support Workers (the yellow Angels) who provide much valued and appreciated community palliative /end of life care.

Our Friends membership has remained stable during Covid but we would welcome new members to help strengthen our voice. Our membership Secretary Di Goff will be delighted to hear from anyone who would like to help us. Di can be contacted through the hospital in Streche Road, Wareham.

We are grateful for all the support we receive to help us promote, acknowledge and support our local services in Purbeck and send our sincere thanks.

A message from the Mayor of Swanage - Councillor Avril Harris

As I write this, we're at the end of the second day of Storm Eunice. Horizontal rain has given way to sunshine but we still have very strong winds and I'm wondering what damage there will have been in the town by the end of the storm. We're told this is a "once in a hundred years" event but it's clear we're seeing more gales and "weather events" than a few years ago.

One of the projects involving the Town Council is joint working with Dorset Council on flood prevention proposals for the Lower High Street and along the Mowlem end of Shore Road, raising the level of the sea wall a little. It's hoped that this stretch of Shore Road will eventually be pedestrianised, though this will take some years to achieve.

Covid 19 apart, climate change is the greatest challenge we face. Along with many, if not most, other councils, the Town council declared a Climate Crisis in September 2019 (including the intention to "use its best endeavours to make Swanage Town Council carbon neutral by 2030") and formed an Environment Policy with an Action Plan which is updated as items are completed. Recently, a decision was made to engage an energy consultant to support council staff in continuing the development of a 'Carbon Neutral 2030' plan.

Pandemic precautions are now reducing so a "mayoral engagement" earlier this month was a visit to the Swanage Ladies' Club which was celebrating its fifth birthday with a very grand cake (I enjoyed a very tasty slice). Formed by members of a former branch of the Women's Institute, this sociable group meets monthly at All Saints' Church Hall to enjoy a get-together and a contribution from a guest speaker.

It's pleasing to see that the #Willdoes mobile youth bus, to help the mental and physical wellbeing of young people, will be in Swanage at Main Beach Car Park regularly. This specially fitted out double-decker bus is the result of a tremendous fund-raising campaign led by Lesley Paddy in memory of her son, Will.

As the days lengthen and we see signs of spring, at last we can look forward to the return of our many regular events starting with the Swanage Classic Car Show the weekend after Easter. This will be the last organised by Jenny Lazenbury who is bowing out after an amazing nearly 30 years! This event is the first in a very long list – and it's an increasing list too, particularly with a number of sports events having arrived in the last few years.

Dorset National Park – for a Thriving, Greener Future

A Director of the Dorset Wildlife Trust recently noted the continued decline in biodiversity across Dorset. For example, there has been a 51% decline in bees, with 23 lost species, a 42% decline in butterflies, and 24 moth species are now extinct. Other species in Dorset are on the edge of extinction. Some 60% of unimproved grassland and flower rich meadows has been lost in the last 30 years. Despite the AONBs covering 52% of rural Dorset, the areas designated for nature amount to much less. Only 8% are “sites of special scientific interest” (SSSIs) and less than half of these are in favourable condition.

The Environment Agency has noted that Dorset’s streams and rivers are also not in great shape. As a result, the important saltmarsh areas in Poole Harbour continue to decline.

We all want a thriving, successful, greener future for our communities and economy. A National Park can help make a greener future a reality. It would bring additional resources and expertise to help nature recover, bring people closer to nature, and benefit health and wellbeing, working closely with local communities.

Dorset’s unique environment is a great asset of local, national and international importance. Farmers and land managers are vital to its future. A National Park would help them secure opportunities for new farm funding that will benefit the environment and help them diversify their sources of income. The South Downs National Park, in its Local Plan, has a specific aim to support and improve farm viability, and works in close partnership with the NFU, CLA and others.

There’s growing agreement that we need positive approaches and new thinking (sometimes combined with old wisdom) to help achieve a more sustainable future. A Dorset National Park can help deliver these positive solutions, and work in partnership with communities, the Dorset Council, businesses, farmers and land managers to build prosperity and a sustainable, greener economy.

Uplifting News following theft of Defibrillator

LAST MONTH we wrote with the sad news that the defibrillator and trauma kit located at the Swanage Rowing club had been stolen. This was an unexpected "blow" to SCDP; we have been so wonderfully supported by our local community since starting this project, that it made it difficult to comprehend why anyone would wish to steal a life-saving device, provided by the community, for the community.

We are, however, delighted and grateful that we have been offered support to replace the missing defibrillator by Swanage and Purbeck Rotary, who have kindly provided funding to cover the replacement costs. This follows Rotary's successful fundraising at Christmastime enabling support of community initiatives. Other individuals and groups have also offered fundraising support to the SCDP estate which continues to grow.

A new defibrillator and cabinet are planned for Burlington Chine thanks to a group of local ladies who are actively fundraising so please look out for a raffle and a fundraising quiz in the near future and David and Louise Elm are planning a **quiz on Thursday 10th March at the British Legion** in support of SCDP funds. Maria Munn has also kindly offered support following her Christmas photographic fundraising. Thank you to you all.

We are receiving several requests to re-introduce defibrillator familiarisation sessions which we had stopped due to Covid. We are hoping to restart sessions from mid March and will be contacting organisations in the near future with dates.

Swanage Medical Practice News

NHS Covid Pass for Travel

With travel restrictions being lifted in the UK and the rest of the world starting to open for travel, we would like to remind you about how to access your NHS Covid Pass to be able to prove your vaccination status.



If you're aged 12 or over - you can get a digital NHS COVID Pass for travel through the free NHS App. You can access the app through a mobile device such as a smartphone or tablet. Proof of your covid-19 vaccination status will be shown within the NHS App. We recommend that you register with the app before booking international travel. For access via the NHS app you do not need to contact your GP.

Travelling with children under 12 years of age - We have had a few enquiries from parents with children under 12 who have not been vaccinated but where some countries require vaccination for entry. We cannot help you with these enquiries; you will need to check the entry requirements for the country you are travelling to and in some cases, you might need to arrange a private PCR test for your child to be able to enter a country. Covid Vaccines

A reminder that you can still book your Covid vaccines at the Wareham Hospital. Vaccines for all eligible age groups aged 12+ are available and can be booked via the NHS National Booking system.

Travel Vaccinations

With travel restrictions starting to be lifted you might be considering travel to a country where you need travel vaccinations. Foreign travel may expose patients to certain infections, so it is important to be immunised. If you have a trip planned, at a minimum of 6 weeks in advance of travel, please collect a 'Foreign Travel Form' from reception or complete our online travel form at: <https://www.swanagemedical.org.uk/pages/Travel-Vaccinations> Once completed this will be passed to a nurse who will contact you direct to book an appointment. Most travel vaccinations incur a charge. Please note we are no longer a Yellow Fever Centre.

Face covering required in our Practice

Please can we ask that you continue to wear a face covering when you attend the surgery. Face coverings remain a recommendation in Public Health England's infection prevention control guidelines for all staff and visitors in a healthcare setting. We would also ask that, where possible, you follow social distancing rules when visiting our surgery. Thank you for your support in helping us protect our patients and staff.

The Practice Patient Participation Group

The Swanage Medical Practice Patient Participation Group (PPG) is made up of patients registered with the Practice who have volunteered to work with the Practice Manager and the GPs to help improve and shape local health services. This small independent group, which used to be known as The Friends of the Practice, meets regularly and provides a way for patients to get involved with the Practice and to influence decisions about local services. Members are also kept informed about the Practice. The Group provides a forum to identify the needs of patients and to hear their views - the aim is to ensure the views and interests of all patients registered with the Practice are represented. It's all about making sure patients are put first.

Swanage and Purbeck Ambulance Car – the fight to keep it is now critical



IT IS NOW TWO YEARS since we first found out the Swanage Ambulance Car was going to be withdrawn. We still haven't seen any plan from health funders Dorset CCG to carry out the formal consultation of local residents that our MP Richard Drax has repeatedly promised. Formal consultation takes time, and **Dorset CCG themselves cease to exist on 1st July, when a new 'Integrated Care System' will take over our health care.** We've got a very strong case to retain the Swanage-based Paramedic Car which should be staffed 24/7:

The geography: The longest cul-de-sac in Purbeck:

- Once Poole A&E and Maternity close, local people here will face the longest journeys, of 30 miles to access emergency hospital care, much of it on winding country roads that are packed in the summer - and for much of the year as Purbeck has become a favourite for tourists to visit.
- Tethering: As the Car does not routinely take people to hospital, and because it supports GP Home Visits, it is 'tethered' to Swanage. So it is often first on the scene, preserving life until the ambulance comes, or for less serious emergencies, treating patients at the scene, saving scarce double-crewed ambulance resources.

The need:

- In 2019, when the Car was well staffed, it attended almost 1,000 (996) call outs to Swanage and Isle of Purbeck villages, 60% were Category 1-3 (the more serious emergencies). with over 400 (416) Categories 1 & 2 (risk to life calls).

The impact of reduced Car staffing:

- In October 2019, when the Car was staffed for 27 days, the average wait for a Category 1 Response

was within the 7 minute target, for Category 2, it was 36 minutes. In October 2021, when the Car was staffed for 11 days, the wait times doubled, meaning it would be unlikely that Category 1 patients could be resuscitated and around half of Category 2 patients might escalate to Category 1 - if not attended to in a timely way.

- Longer response times can't be attributed to more call-outs to this area, as call-outs declined between October 2019 and October 2021.

The promises:

- The Car was allocated here in perpetuity in 2008 when Swanage Cottage Hospital MIU first closed overnight, in recognition of the distance to Poole hospital. An example of how long it took to get from Swanage to Poole in an imminent danger of death emergency in 2017 - the average time for Category 1 Swanage and Isle of Purbeck emergencies, from the call being made to the Ambulance Trust to the arrival of the patient at Poole Hospital, was 1 hour, 43 minutes.
- With the decision to close Poole A&E, Maternity and Children's units, recognising we would have further still to go to access emergency hospital care, Dorset CCG made a minuted promise that Swanage ambulance station would remain open and our ambulances would be fully manned.

Will residents be duly consulted? If not, we will need Dorset Council to stand up for us. We are nearly at the 5,000 signatures needed to get to full Council: Please sign and Share!: <https://you.38degrees.org.uk/petitions/dorset-council-save-swanage-ambulance-car-1>

Are you a 'real' Friend of Swanage Hospital?

This means that Gift Aid reclaim monies are received quicker and making the whole reclaim procedure easier for us. Any

existing Friends who currently use cheques or cash may also like to consider using this method.

For those who would prefer not to do things online, a Standing Order form (a Standing Order is an amount set by you which can only be altered by you with your bank) can be obtained from the hospital. Cash or Cheques made payable to "League of Friends of Swanage Hospital" - can be sent to the hospital. Online or standing order options are generally easier for members, as they happen automatically without you having to remember to send cash/cheque each year and you remain as members.



STUDLAND SNIPPETS

Studland Parish Council

Welcome news that the Knoll House planning application has been rejected due to environmental harm being greater than any economic benefits. Disappointment that the Dorset Council ward member and a Dorset councillor from Swanage seemed to overstate the economic benefits and almost bypass the environmental objections. Group TPO request for trees opposite the Knoll House not granted on the grounds that the National Trust is seen by Dorset Council as an adequate guardian for trees, despite in Purbeck having no dedicated tree management policy. Parish Council requesting a review. Growing concerns over inconsiderate parking on Beach Road – blocking access for residents and key service vehicles. Ongoing support for the “20 is Plenty Campaign”-speed limits through the village. More solar panels are being planned for properties in Studland Conservation Area, despite visual effects - take a look from Ballard Down. The Parish Council has joined the “Dorset Deserves Better” campaign. Major concerns about the cessation of tree work applications to Parish and Town Councils - strong case for restoring direct notifications weekly to Parish/Town clerks.

Dorset Campaign to Protect Rural England (the Countryside Charity)

Watch out for consultations on a) Bournemouth, Christchurch and Poole Local Plan, and b) DEFRA Biodiversity Net Gain both due to close late March. Stour Valley Park - a new initiative with so little publicity yet has a huge impact. Supported tree planting with Hampshire CPRE and local schools.

Healthwatch Dorset recently investigated why people are struggling to get dental care in the county, finding only three of Dorset's 99 NHS registered dental practices who were taking on new adult patients and only 13 who were accepting children as new patients.

Access to NHS dentistry has been one of the most significant issues raised with Healthwatch across England over the last 18 months since the start of the COVID-19 pandemic.

Over half the enquiries dealt with by Healthwatch Dorset this year have been about NHS dentistry. People have reported that they are unable to find a dentist to get routine or urgent dental care, with many experiencing significant and worsening pain due to delays in treatment. Over the last six months Healthwatch Dorset has seen an increase in enquiries from people trying to get dental care for their children. (see public comments in Notes at the end of this article)...

From September to November 2021, a team of Healthwatch Dorset volunteers contacted all 99 of Dorset's NHS registered dental practices to investigate the situation. 74 dental practices responded, six did not respond because they were no longer treating NHS patients and 19 did not respond, despite being called three or more times and being sent a letter about the research. All the findings are published in a new Healthwatch Dorset report: Accessing dental care in Dorset which clearly demonstrates why the public are raising concerns:

- **ONLY three of the 74 dental practices who responded were taking on new NHS patients, though six said they were taking on new NHS patients who were pregnant.**
- **ONLY four practices said they were taking on new NHS patients who were being treated for cancer. Another five said they would see people receiving cancer treatment, but only if they were referred and/or had additional needs, for example, a disability or diagnosed mental health condition, under the discretion of the dentist.**
- **ONLY 13 practices were taking on children as new NHS patients, and two of those only in emergencies. A further seven said they would see children, but only if their parents were registered as private patients.**
- **ONLY 18 (25%) of the dental practices that responded had a waiting list for NHS patients; 48 (65%) did not. Waiting times varied and some practices did not know when they would open their waiting list.**
- **66 (49%) of dental practices reached were seeing existing patients for routine appointments.**

In response, Healthwatch Dorset is calling on those responsible for dental care to improve the situation in the following ways:

- More urgent dental care should be made available.
- All NHS dentists should be advised to make places available for children without restrictions.
- All NHS dentists should be advised and funded to provide places for people who are pregnant and/or undergoing cancer treatment.
- Clearer public information and better communication is needed to help people understand why NHS dental care is limited and how they can find care when they need it.
- The charity Dentaid should continue to be funded to provide local dental care for people experiencing homelessness.
- The Government and NHS England should build on the recent one-off funding of £50 million for 350,000 extra NHS dental appointments by the end of March 2022, by speeding up dental contract reform and providing significant sustained funding to tackle the underlying problems of dental access and affordability (Healthwatch England Report, Recovery of NHS dental care too slow to help thousands left in pain - Dec 2021).

Healthwatch Dorset has shared its findings and recommendations with Dorset NHS commissioners, Dorset Local Dental Committee, dental care providers, local Councils, the South West Dental Commissioning Team, and NHS England, to highlight people's concerns.

The following are a selection of comments from the public about dental care in Dorset:

- "The tooth needs to be removed, but I was told to find a private dentist as NHS treatment was not possible. That is money I do not have."
- "My daughter needs to go to the dentist and the only way I seem to be able to do this, is to pay extortionate private fees."
- "My dentist has taken me off their caseload as I had not attended for a period of time. I am a nurse working full-time, currently pregnant and have not had time during COVID to book an appointment. I thought the practice should've given me notice of terminating me from their books."

We would never recommend doing this yourself.

A phishing email purporting to be from British Gas is circulating, stating that customers' bills are overdue and need paying. It attempts to extort the recipient's account details by urging them to click through to fake websites.


