Here at the Swanage Food Bank it's been a bit quieter recently, but by the time you read this, who knows? We may be rushed off our feet! But, busy or quiet, holiday or term-time we're always here, ready to help local folks who are struggling with food supplies.

Swanage Food Bank



Each team of three volunteers turns up to the Food Bank (at the United Reformed Church up the High Street) on the Monday, Wednesday and Friday of their duty week so we can be open between

12 and 2pm to serve clients. We have six teams that rotate and also some drivers to call on if deliveries are necessary - it really helps us if you're able to come and collect, though - at the arranged time! Someone always has the mobile phone too and checks it regularly for messages. Do phone us if you need us - 07759 230313.

Our shelves are kept topped up by the generous physical and financial donations of local people. There are collection bins in Budgens, Co-op, Costcutter and Spar plus collection crates in local churches. You can also drop donations in to the Food Bank direct when we're open (parking is a bit tricky though!). Thank you so much - your kind gifts enable us to bless many in need.

A list of our "most needed" items is to be found on the collection bin lids, but we always appreciate:

- Tea, coffee, squash & biscuits (sweet & savoury)
- · Cereals, jam & marmalade
- Tinned tuna, baked beans & spaghetti hoops
- · Tinned meats & veg, rice & noodles, pasta & sauce
- Puddings
- Toiletries

Please make sure all donations are in-date and unopened.

If you need help over a period of time we may ask you to get a referral. This simply means you need to ask an 'agency' that knows your situation to give us a phone call to confirm that you need our help. This referral agency might be your child's school, a social worker or housing officer, church minister, GP, midwife or health visitor, the Focus Centre or Citizen's Advice for example.

We're looking forward to a visit from our MP, Mr Lloyd Hatton, in a few weeks' time. As the Government considers its food strategy we're pleased to be able to have a conversation with him about the part we play in food provision in the Swanage locality. And we're always interested in building links with other food providers in the town.

We're currently trialling a partnership with Dog Friendly Dorset, so we often have a decent supply of dog food. You don't necessarily have to need human food to access the pet food - just phone us on 07759 230313 - you will need to come to collect, though.




"What a lovely garden this is"



We have given two talks this Spring, one to the WI and one to U3A, which covered the history of the garden up to the present day. We are also due to give a talk to the Rotary in May.





Mining museum opens its doors to the local community

The chance to discuss the varied work of volunteers and see behind the scenes of one of the area's most popular heritage attractions was an opportunity not to be missed for many members of the local community at the end of February. The large number of visitors to the special Community Weekend organised by the Swanage Railway demonstrated the high level of interest in the railway and related attractions including The Purbeck Mining Museum at Norden.



Here, visitors had the opportunity to chat with former miner Brian Biles and to meet many of the volunteers of all ages who help to shine the light on an industry that has played such an important part in the area's economic and ecological heritage.

The two-day event also gave visitors the chance to look around the engine shed and see demonstrations of historic locomotives pulling clay wagons along the narrow gauge railway adjacent to the museum. The Swanage Railway also provided a wide range of different activities for visitors, including driver experience sessions and signal box tours.

"We were delighted to welcome so many people from the local area and show them just how fulfilling it is to be part of such an enthusiastic team of volunteers", says Paola Hobson, the Purbeck Mining Museum's Group Administrator. "We will always give a warm welcome to anyone who'd like to get involved. Such support could be meeting and greeting visitors and hosting tour groups or working on a myriad of maintenance and support activities behind the scenes - from curation, industrial archaeology and landscaping to construction, engineering and electrical work. The museum is run entirely by volunteers so any help - even if it's just a few hours every now and then - is always appreciated."

Swanage Community Defibrillator Partnership Keep the heart of Swanage beating



EMPOWERING HEARTS- A DECADE OF LIFESAVING

This year marks the tenth anniversary of Swanage Community Defibrillator Partnership founded with the mission to raise funds and install four public access Automated External Defibrillators (AED's)in Swanage. We are proud to announce that our efforts have expanded and we now have 45 sites across Purbeck with more units on the way thanks to ongoing fundraising initiatives in Swanage and in Wareham where a SCDP sub-group is being formed to facilitate the siting of new defibs.

As we celebrate this 10-year milestone we recognise that some of our original devices and first generation cabinets are coming to the end of their operational lifecycle. To ensure the continued success of our project we are aiming to raise £10,000 this year - one thousand pounds for each year of service. These funds will be dedicated to replacing older devices and cabinets thereby maintaining the safety and well-being of our community by ensuring that the kit is 'rescue ready'.

We have a fundraising plan which includes a **SCDP Fun Day** on Monday May 5th at Swanage Cricket Club from 1-4 to which all are invited. Please do join us. Donations are always welcomed and can be made through Corbens in Station Rd, Swanage.

As we have mentioned on many occasions the success of our project is due in part to the support we receive from our Defib guardians who regularly monitor and maintain the devices . There are now over 25 guardians who send their monthly returns to Deirdre Mersey for coordination who in turn advises steering group members of any problems. It was a great pleasure for me to award Deirdre, in my role as Rotary President, a Paul Harris Fellowship, for her dedication and commitment to her community role within the Defib project. I was pleased that Ian Brown a fellow SCDP steering group member was able to join me for the presentation held recently at the Swanage School.

I've recently found myself living alone after the breakdown of my relationship. My council tax bill is due soon, and I'm worried I won't be able to afford to pay it on my own. I'm already struggling to cover the cost of my other bills. What can I do?

You're not alone in worrying about struggling to pay your bills. It's a difficult time for people who are battling rising costs for food and essentials - as well as seeing their bills creep up. Fortunately, there are options available to people struggling to pay their council tax, but you'll need to find out if you're eligible first. You might be entitled to pay less, or not at all, depending on your circumstances, because councils offer discounts and other reductions.

Firstly, because you're the only adult living in your home, your council tax bill can be reduced by a quarter. For example, if your bill is £1,000 for the year, you'll only have to pay £750 now that you live on your own. You'll need to tell your council someone has moved out of your home and the date that they left. You're entitled to the discount from when they moved out - even if it was a while ago.

When the council works out how many people live in a property, there are certain people that don't count - they're called 'disregarded people'. This includes under-18s, full-time students, long-term hospital patients, people with severe mental impairments, and many more. You can check our website for more information on disregarded people. In some situations, everyone living in a home is disregarded. If this is the case, the council tax bill will be reduced by half. If everyone in a home is a student or severely mentally impaired, there'll be no council tax to pay. If you live with an adult who isn't disregarded, but who is on a low income or receives certain benefits, you might be able to get a discount called a 'second adult rebate'. You can find out more about getting a second adult rebate on our website.

If you or someone you live with is disabled, this can also affect your council tax banding. If your home has been adapted, you can ask to be placed down one band. For example, if you're living in a band C property that has been adapted for a disabled resident, you should only be charged council tax for a band B property. There's also something called Council Tax Reduction, which is designed for people on low incomes. Your council will ask for details about your income and circumstances, to check if you're eligible. If you are, they'll reduce the amount of council tax you have to pay. When it comes to Council Tax Reductions, different rules apply depending on whether you've reached State Pension age.

And lastly, if you're struggling to pay for essentials, your council can reduce your bill further, or cancel it altogether, under what's known as a 'discretionary reduction'. This usually only happens if you can provide evidence that you're suffering severe hardship and can't afford to pay council tax. If you're in this situation, ask your council for help. If you're not given a discretionary reduction, you might be able to appeal to a valuation tribunal. If the tribunal agrees with you, they can order your council to reduce or even cancel your council tax bill.

Whatever circumstances you're in, if you're struggling with your council tax payments, it's important to let your council know. Citizens Advice is also here to help you find a way forward, should you need our support.

Beaver fever!

In March, we released two pairs of beavers into Little Sea, Studland. Purbeck was the first place in England to be granted a government licence for a 'wild' beaver release like this – and the story attracted the attention of national TV, radio and newspapers.



The new beavers now join the family that arrived there in 2024 by unknown means – so hopefully we'll have the start of a viable population. By creating sunny glades, new water channels and deep pools, the beavers will enhance the habitat for lots of other species, especially dragonflies, wetland birds, amphibians, bats and water voles.

Beavers are a native species and were present across the country – but were hunted to extinction in the UK around 400 years ago. So we're thrilled to welcome them back! You can read more here: www.nationaltrust.org.uk/visit/dorset/studland-bay/re-introducing-beavers-to-studland

Bunting bonanza

In July last year, we reported that a cirl bunting had been spotted in Purbeck, for the first time since 1968. So were excited to hear that a flock of 20 of these rare songbirds was spotted recently at Weston Farm, Worth Matravers.

We are managing the farm for nature recovery, so this is exactly the kind of news we've been hoping for. These striking birds were feeding on seeds in the hedgerows, and insects in the rough grassland and bare patches where pigs have churned up the soil.

The cirl bunting was once common in southern England but declined dramatically from the early 50s, only surviving in a small area of Devon. It just goes to show that nature can recover if we give it space and the right conditions.

Help protect ground-nesting birds

New signs have gone up in the dunes and heathland on the Studland peninsula to help protect ground-nesting birds. People are being asked to keep their dogs on the standard of the standard of

short leads in these areas to avoid disturbance to rare birds like the nightjar, stonechat, woodlark and Dartford warbler.

Ground-nesting birds are masters of camouflage, but dogs can sniff them out – once the bird leaves the nest, eggs are vulnerable to other birds like gulls and crows. The restrictions will also help prevent dogs being bitten by adders which are now coming out of hibernation.

The restrictions in the dunes and heathland are from 1st March to 31st July – similar rules apply to heathlands and open access sites across the country. The beaches are covered by different regulations – you can pick up a leaflet which explains them all at the Knoll Beach information office.

Love Studland's beaches and dunes?

If so, Dorset Council wants to hear from you about a new Anti-social Behaviour Public Spaces Protection Order for Studland. This order aims to address issues like wild camping, littering and lighting fires. Your feedback will help shape the final decisions made by the council.
