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Swanage Community Defibrillator Partnership

Keep the heart of Swanage beating



"The heatwave sees a surge in Defibrillator use"

This is the headline in a recent South Today news bulletin which goes on to encourage people to check their defibs and ensure they are registered on the national database 'The Circuit' so that they are "rescue ready".

Within Swanage Community Defib Partnership we too have seen an increased need for defibs as the hot weather exacerbates some existing heart conditions and the area becomes busy.

AND ... thanks to our excellent team of volunteer Defib Guardians we can confidently say that the public access defibs under our management are checked regularly, with guardians reporting to a central point fortnightly linking them with 'the Circuit' ensuring that our defibs are "rescue ready" in the event of an emergency.

We now have oversight of approaching 70 defibs across Purbeck (4 was our original aim in 2015!) Maintenance and replacement of batteries and pads is now a major expense so financial support is gratefully received to help us sustain what has become a very successful community project. Our congratulations to the Team at the Therapy Centre in Swanage who recently undertook a strenuous sponsored walk across Purbeck to fund a defib and cabinet for the Centre which will be attached on an outside wall for public access. Our thanks to *Swanage Sparks* for once again supporting the electrical installation of this device.

I hired a company to install concrete fencing and a gate in my back garden. The quality of the work is poor, some wooden panels are loose and the gate doesn't shut properly. I paid before I inspected the work. What can I do?

When you put your trust in a trader and they don't meet your expectations it can be really frustrating.

When there's a problem caused by a trader, you should be able to get it fixed or get some money back. Evidence is important - take photos and make notes about what happened and when, including times and dates, and keep hold of receipts or other proof of payment.

People can experience different types of problems with traders, and **there's specific advice available on our website depending on what the issue is**. In your situation, it's important to note if a trader hasn't done a good job with 'reasonable care and skill', the Consumer Rights Act 2015 entitles you to ask for the problem to be fixed or for a refund. This is something you can mention when you take the problem up with the trader and cite your evidence. They should fix the problem within a reasonable amount of time, without causing you too much inconvenience. The law doesn't say what counts as reasonable, so you'll have to agree on it with them.

If they can't or won't fix the problem, you can ask for a partial or full refund, depending on how bad the problem is. You'll have to come to an agreement about how much you should get. It's a good idea to start by suggesting a figure and explaining why you think it's reasonable, then take it from there. Once you've agreed on the amount with the trader the law says you should get your refund within 14 days.

If you can't come to an agreement, or they refuse to fix the problem or give you a refund, there are other steps you can take - including complaining to your card provider if you paid by card.

You can check if the trader is a member of a trade association or quality scheme. If they are, they might have to follow certain rules, and if they've broken them you could get help to take your complaint further. They might be part of an **alternative dispute resolution (ADR) scheme** - a way of solving disagreements with a trader without going to court - or they might agree to use one. If the trader isn't part of an ADR scheme, and you've already complained to your card provider and the complaint isn't resolved, **you may be able to complain to the Financial Ombudsman Service**.

Anyone who is experiencing a problem with building work, decorating or home improvements can **contact the Citizens Advice Consumer Service** for advice and support from a trained adviser. The helpline number is 0808 223 1133

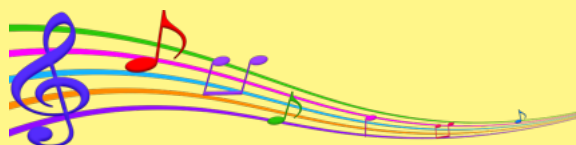


Forget-Me-Not-Club in Swanage

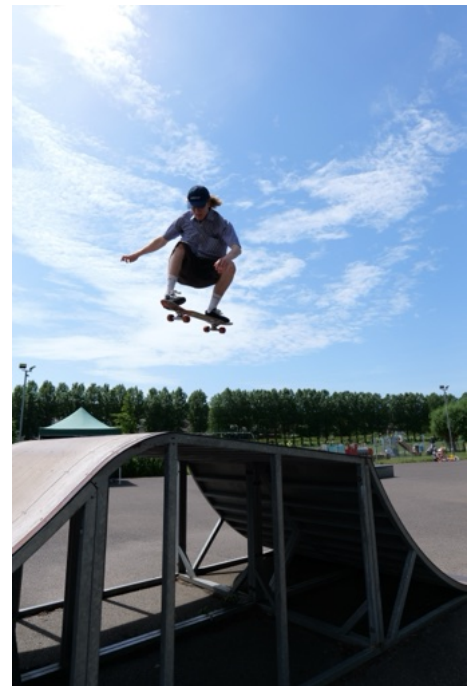

New Local Histories at Swanage Museum

Swanage Museum and History Centre are proud to have supported the publication of two new local histories. David Hawkings' *The Tower On The Hill* was published by respected publisher Halsgrove. The first comprehensive study of water in Swanage, it tells the fascinating story of how the town's supply developed from springs and wells to the construction of dramatic towers built to bring fresh water to the growing Victorian holiday resort. George Burt's obelisk on Ballard Down and his imposing tower at Durlston still command attention today.

Swanage Museum has been active in bringing a forgotten part of the town's history to light. In his new book *Rediscovering Tinkleford*, author Brian Salter tells the story of a model village which was once a popular attraction at the Virginia Cottage Tea Rooms. It later moved to various locations in the town before being stored away and forgotten for more than twenty years. Thanks to the efforts of Museum volunteers, many of the model buildings now form a display in the Museum, which has proved very popular with visitors.

Both books are on sale in the Museum.

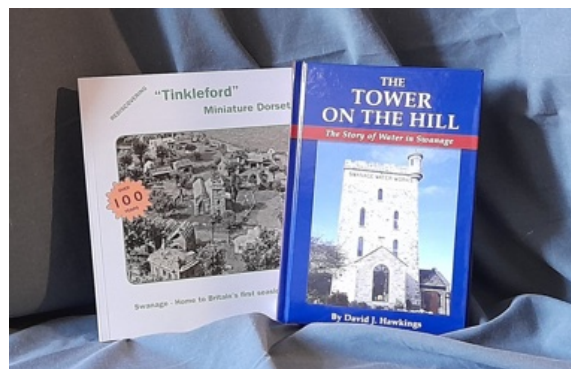

Classic car rally heads to Norden for huge group visit to Purbeck's "hidden gem"

The Purbeck Mining Museum hosted its largest ever adult visitor group in May as nearly 100 classic car enthusiasts were given guided tours around the popular visitor attraction at Norden. The special visit was a key feature in the itinerary of the three day Jurassic Coast Rally organised to mark the fiftieth anniversary of the Traction Owners Club and included participants from all corners of the UK as well as Ireland and France. The line-up of over forty pre-1957 Citroën cars and commercial vehicles was an impressive sight in the large car park at Norden Park adjacent to the museum and feedback from the visit was extremely positive.

"Everyone really enjoyed the tours around the museum and were fascinated to see and hear all about an industry that has played such a significant role over many centuries in helping to shape the countryside, economy and communities in this area of the Purbecks," says Gavin Davey, one of the rally's organisers. "It really is a hidden gem in the Isle of Purbeck. Everyone at the museum couldn't have been more welcoming, and hearing first hand experience from a former miner provided real insight into the workings of a mine and the huge scale of mining operations in years gone by."

According to Museum Lead, Peter Sills, the continuing rise in visitor numbers to the Purbeck Mining Museum has led to more and more organisations and community groups arranging group visits. "We welcome groups of all ages and always ensure we have volunteers on hand to cater for specific requirements and areas of interest. The visit of the Traction Owners Club was our largest adult visitor group to date. We split the group into three tour groups to ensure everyone had the opportunity to ask questions and to take in the atmosphere of an authentic and restored clay mine."

Collaboration gives children a fascinating insight into a bygone age

The Purbecks have provided over 200 children from schools across the UK with exciting new adventures and educational insights thanks to a progressive collaboration between an outdoor activity specialist and a Dorset heritage attraction. The Purbeck Mining Museum at Norden has hosted a series of group visits for children as part of a programme of residential outdoor activities organised by Swanage-based Cumulus Outdoors. The initiative has proved hugely successful as it has shown how fun and exciting experiences in a vibrant adventure water park owe much to the spirit and graft of former clay miners. According to Sandra Hayman, Programme Administrator at Cumulus Outdoors, the opportunity for children to see an authentic clay mine from years gone by is a perfect learning experience after they've had fun in the Waterpark lakes and Mud Trail at the nearby Dorset Adventure Park.

"The lakes and surrounding landscape were all formed by clay mining activities so it's invaluable for the children to appreciate that their water park enjoyment is directly connected with an industry that was at the heart of Purbeck's economy for several centuries and which has quite literally shaped the local landscape. The feedback from the children and the teaching staff from the various schools has been really positive, so we will be looking to extend this collaboration next year and beyond. It's always a pleasure to showcase the contribution of a bygone age for curious and inquisitive young visitors," adds Museum Lead, Peter Sills. "With a strong educational focus, we're delighted the museum helps to shine a light on an industry that was the dominant employer and at the very heart of Purbeck life for so many years. Our collaborative approach with Cumulus Outdoors is helping to ensure the next generation appreciates and understands such an important heritage."

The series of recent group visits to the Purbeck Mining Museum featured schools from Uxbridge, Reading, Jersey, Birmingham and Devon. During their stay in the Purbecks, Cumulus Outdoors provided campsite accommodation and organised various activities for the children that included kayaking, stand-up paddleboarding, beach safety, climbing, tunnelling and tag archery.

The Purbeck Mining Museum is run entirely by volunteers and provides an extensive array of equipment, artefacts, displays and AV presentations with periodic demonstrations of engine and wagon movements on the restored narrow gauge railway network around the main mining building. Open most days throughout the summer until October, full details on opening times are posted on the museum's website, www.purbeckminingmuseum.org. This also provides more information on Purbeck's clay mining industry and the various roles and opportunities for volunteers who are always given a warm welcome, even if they are only available for just a few hours every now and then.

Herston 'Community' Halt

Much of our focus over recent months has been to increase the amount of stored rain water at Herston Halt. Two new water tanks were installed over the winter, and various new pipes provided to move water around this site. For the first time there are hanging baskets up at the station during the summer months and I thank Richard Walbridge for his assistance. A considerable effort is now keeping them watered every day despite the high temperatures and some persistent wind.

I continue to raise the profile of our team within the community, and I'm pleased that there has been some fruitful interest. Having managed the station for almost 30 years it is inevitable that there is a steady changeover of faces; some staying longer than others. I'm extremely grateful for all of the help that I have received over the years, but the push to find new blood continues. Nick Smith from Worth Matravers has been an excellent recent find, with Graeme Barnes too, & there are two more volunteers in the pipeline. At the beginning of July, I welcomed 12 volunteers from Network Rail (Wales & West) who undertook a number of maintenance tasks. I'm also pleased that we've pushed on with one of our longer-term projects - to extend one of the sidings by 120 feet. The track was laid for 'Mercury Siding' about 18 months ago, and now we continue with extending the working surface, to enable our volunteers to work on railway vehicles during the summer months.

Hospital is managed by Maria Williams, a former Occupational Therapist, who is inevitably only too aware of the importance of movement, support and a degree of independence in maintaining our health and wellbeing. A major part of the team's work is centred around the rehabilitation of patients to support them in living what may be a very different kind of life, as well as they can. This means enabling patients to get out of bed, perhaps move to the day room to join other patients, and supporting them to sit and stand safely and in comfort. We were pleased therefore to receive a funding request from Maria, reminding us of the positive and lasting impact that specialist rise and recline chairs can have in rehabilitating vulnerable patients recovering from strokes, living with Parkinson's or facing mobility challenges.

Tilt and space chairs were a new concept to many of us and are invaluable for patients with jerky movements who are not always safe in a riser recliner. All the chairs requested have built in pressure relieving to prevent pressure sores. They also have wheels and an attendant push bar so that patients who are less mobile can be wheeled to join other patients in the day room or patient lounge. Another bonus is that they simulate chairs that patients may be used to at home, which builds confidence, whilst offering a greater degree of accessibility and comfort. Hospital furniture must now meet the highest fire standards, which inevitably impacts cost, so we were delighted to be able to purchase four riser recliners and one tilt in space chair at a total of just under £8000. We received this very happy photo of Ward Manager Maria, Matron Zoe, Sister Vickie and HCA Jane, expressing their thanks and showing off the chairs. They are already very much in use, and the team tell us they are bringing huge improvements to patients and, through their manoeuvrability, help staff too.



A quick, but heartfelt thank you to everyone who supported our Afternoon Tea in June. We had to switch from the hospital garden to the Catholic Hall at short notice, and the weather was atrocious on the day, but lots of you came along, and we had a lovely morning. Nearly £1600 was raised to support hospital patient services and staff, which is just amazing. Thank you so much, until next time, take care.

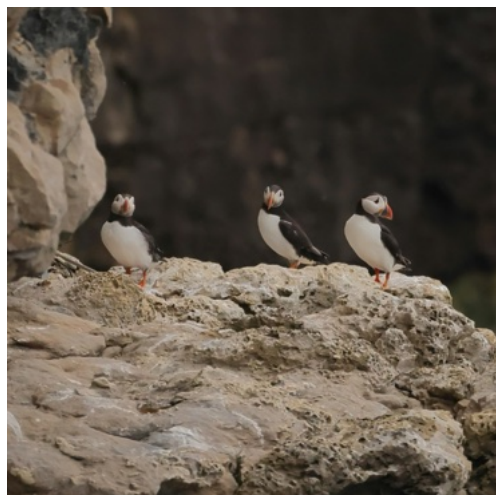

Puffling in Purbeck!

For the first time in decades, there has been a confirmed sighting of a puffin fledgling in Purbeck (called a puffling). It was spotted in a rock crevice near Dancing Ledge by the volunteers who have been monitoring the puffins over the summer.

The sighting was the culmination of weeks of watching the adult birds carrying fish into their nests which are deep in the ledge. The last time volunteers observed this feeding behaviour was in 2023 – but the puffins stopped abruptly after just 25 days, suggesting the chicks (which take about 40 days to fledge) died prematurely.

Pufflings are distinguished from the adult birds by their beaks which are smaller and grey, without the iconic orange and blue colours. This puffling will now leave the ledge, and its parents, and stay alone far out at sea, before possibly returning to its birthplace in two years' time. They don't breed until they are about four years old.

Our motion sensor cameras on the ledge will be removed in August. Then volunteers will study the thousands of images to see what they reveal. Watch this space!

Parade of painted ladies

We've seen a welcome influx of butterflies this year – including huge numbers of painted ladies. These migrants travel to the UK from as far away as North Africa. They can cover up to 100 miles per day at 30mph and even fly through the night. Look out for them across the heaths and coastal grasslands. Thistles and nettles are some of their favourite food plants – why not leave a patch of them in your garden and create your own wildlife haven?

This painted lady on red valerian was snapped by Worth Matravers resident, Mike Wenham. When we put his photos on our Facebook page (National Trust Purbeck Countryside), the post received over 2,000 'likes' – making it one of our most popular stories ever!

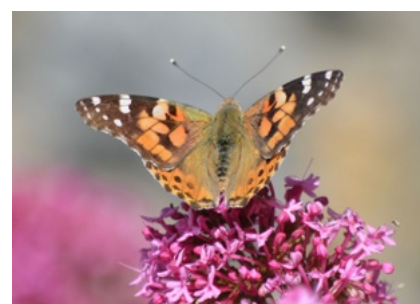

Be tick aware

We usually spread the love for all creatures, but there are some to be cautious of. Ticks are tiny spider-like parasites that latch onto animals (including us) to feed on blood.

In Purbeck, we have lots of deer – which are major carriers of ticks. To stay safe while enjoying our wonderful outdoors:

- Stay on clearly defined paths and avoid long grass
- Wear long trousers and socks
- Use insect repellent
- Check yourself (and pets) regularly for ticks

If you've been bitten by a tick, or have recently spent time outdoors and developed an unusual rash or other symptoms, contact your GP. Some tick bites can result in an infection called Lyme disease, so early awareness matters. Find out more here: <https://www.lymeresourcecentre.com/about-ticks>

Lighting up the hedgerows

Volunteers are reporting encouraging numbers of glow-worms this year. Twelve females were counted one evening on Bonvils Lane, Worth Matravers. On the Winspit transect, a red-light trap attracted too many males to count! (The traps don't harm the glow-worms.)

Local sightings are also increasing, with people in Worth spotting them on evening walks from the pub. We are hugely grateful to the volunteers who give up their time to monitor glow-worms and other species across Purbeck. You can help informally – and make a real contribution to science and conservation – by recording your glow-worm sightings on the iRecord database: <https://irecord.org.uk/>

Glow-worms have a fascinating life cycle. The larvae can live for up to three years, feeding on snails. The adult beetles only live for a few weeks and don't feed at all – all their energy is spent on mating. Although the eggs, larvae and adult males all glow, it's the adult females who shine the brightest. They crawl up vegetation on warm evenings and emit their yellow-green light to attract males.

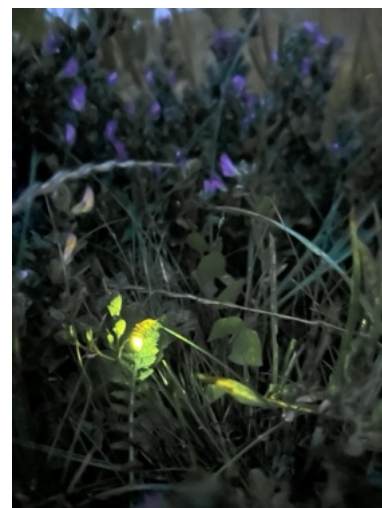

A drive to raise £200,000 has been launched by Wareham's Men's Shed as it tries to secure its future by having its own community workshop.

The Sheddors have been granted planning permission by Dorset Council to erect a 20m x 10m building in the grounds of Swanage and Wareham Rugby Club off Bestwall Road, Wareham.

If they can raise enough money for the build, it will mean an end to the need to rent premises, which runs the risk of tenancy agreements being terminated. And it will ensure they can maintain the Shed's twin aims of providing a haven for lonely, disadvantaged or retired men while making a huge variety of items in wood for the wider community.

Chairman Harold Forbes said: "The cost for a charity like ours is daunting. But it will be more than worth it if we can carry on serving Wareham and district as it has come to expect while continuing to provide a meeting place for men that has been shown to improve mental health and wellbeing.

"We would love to build the workshop ourselves and have many of the skills and tools needed. But the price of materials has skyrocketed and we also have to consider things we cannot do such as footings and core plumbing, so we'll have to pay for a job lot. Given our reputation in the area, we are quietly hoping that a benefactor or sponsor will step forward. But if that doesn't happen we will be pursuing charitable grants and launching a crowdfunding appeal."

In 2024 the Sheddors successfully fought off an eviction attempt by Care Dorset, which housed them at the Purbeck Connect centre in Sandford Lane, Wareham. They were saved by a public outcry. But fearing the writing was on the wall, they moved out a year later and are now in temporary accommodation at Lenctenbury Farm outside the town.

Mr Forbes, who was recently honoured with a Dorset High Sheriff's Award for outstanding service to the community, said: "We also need a new home – and more room – as our membership is steadily increasing, not least because we are in the process of forming a new women's section. Let's hope we can make it all happen."

The Shed's scheme has the support of Wareham Town Council. And Dorset's planning officer, referring to the overwhelming public backing for the application, stated: "The comments confirm that the proposals would result in community benefits and support for members attending the facility."

Swanage Food Bank

Even in this hot weather our dedicated volunteers are working hard at the Food Bank to ensure local folk who need emergency food aid are supplied.

Our Food Bank AGM took place in June and reported that during the past year we have supplied emergency food to 530 local households. We are really grateful for donations of food into the supermarket blue bins and also donations of money which enable us to

operate effectively. The Food Bank currently spends over £1000 each month supplementing the food donations we receive with additional food purchases to ensure all recipients get a balanced food parcel.

If one-off help is needed from the food bank, clients can self-refer by phoning us on 07759 230313. If ongoing help is needed, clients will be asked to get a referral from an agency that is aware of their circumstances and is able to provide additional support and advice - like Citizens Advice, Social Worker, Mental Health Worker, the Focus Centre, or a church minister. We remain committed to ensuring we help those in need, whether with food parcels or by directing them to other supportive agencies.

The Food Bank is open on Mondays, Wednesdays and Fridays between 12-2pm at the United Reformed Church, High Street, BH19 2NY. If our help is needed, please call us in the morning on those days.

We have noticed that the amount of wasted clinic hours has recently increased and we would like to remind patients to cancel appointments in good time if it is not needed so that we have the opportunity to offer the appointment to another patient.

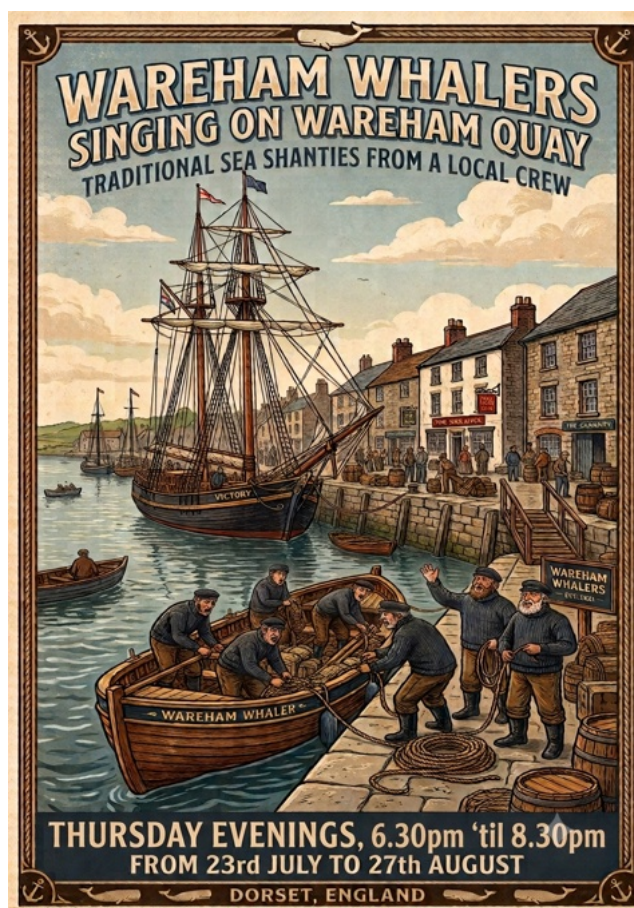
Wareham Whalers
